I suspect that many readers would like to turn the clock back to those half-remembered times when life seemed so much easier, when churches were so much fuller and when there was a strong community spirit and the front row in our church was full of children and young people.

Our turning back of the clocks at the end of October is of course not quite the same thing at all. It is a device, we are told, to reduce road accidents. By playing tricks with the clock we can ensure that even on the shortest of days that children can come and go to school in daylight. It is also an event which reminds us that while we play tricks with clocks, time marches on and we are a few more weeks nearer Christmas and the end of another year.

We are called to a journey which does not stop even though sometimes we get a little diverted, or we go on a little ramble in a different direction! We may have been diverted by celebrations of All Hallows' Eve, known more colloquially as Hallowe'en. Perhaps you were frightened or annoyed by "Trick or Treaters", young folk dressed in hideous masks, purely for commercial gain. "Trick or Treat" must be one of the worst customs to make the journey eastwards across the Atlantic. Is this the price of progress? Perhaps we would be better to turn the clocks back! But as we look backwards, we bump into the celebration of Bonfire night when we are invited to "celebrate" a time of religious conflict, of deep mistrust of people because of their faith, and persecution of those who did not share a particular view of faith – surely not a good time to look back on!

No, we must journey on looking forward to the future. At our Church Meeting on October 27th we will be discussing where we hope our church might be heading, and what sort of ministry we will need to support our vision and hope for the future. For those of you who still possess mechanical clocks, the vision and hope we express at that meeting will be like rewinding the mechanism to give it more energy rather than turning the clocks back. For those with electric clocks it is about reconnecting with power to renew our vision as we move for-

ward. However, this throws down a challenge to each of us to make the words we might express at the meeting a reality in our lives.

We are called to journey in the footsteps of our Lord, guided and empowered by the Holy Spirit so that each of us takes on the being that we are called to be. If this sounds daunting, it is! But remember that every journey begins with a single step and just a few small steps may take us on our journey into an exciting future.

We have many good things going on in our church and there is nothing to get downhearted about. At the end of November we journey into that wonderful period of preparation called Advent. A time when we journey with the real hope and expectation of the coming of our Lord. As the Graham Kendrick song puts it:

"We'll walk the land
With hearts on fire
And every step
will be a prayer
Hope is rising
New day dawning
Sound of singing fills the air."

A REFLECTION

This month we remember. On 1st November it is All Saints Day; on 5th November we remember Guy Fawkes and how he tried to blow up the Houses of Parliament; and then on 10th November it is Remembrance Sunday, and 11th November it is Armistice Day. At the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month World War I ended.

This year it is the 100th Anniversary of when the first Remembrance Sunday took place. Next year will be the 100th Anniversary of the Cenotaph in Whitehall and also the 100th Anniversary of the symbol of the poppy. 'If I am spared' maybe I will write about the Cenotaph and the Poppy next year.

But let's think about Remembrance Sunday. For 100 years we have observed this particular Day. In Churches up and down the land, on the nearest Sunday to 11th November, services have taken place to remember and to commemorate the contribution that British and Commonwealth military and civilian men and women made in the service of their Country. Since 1939, we too have remembered those who gave their lives in WWII and also in more recent conflicts.

For 100 years we have stood for 2 minutes in remembrance of these brave people who have given their lives so that we may live in peace.

What grieves me, is the fact that we shall be thinking of these men and women, and yet there are still so many people dying as a result of civil wars in so many countries now. There are still so many people living in fear because of oppression. There are still so many people leaving their homes, and even their countries, because they do not know if they will be alive by tomorrow if they remain in their homeland. There are still so many people being persecuted because they are Christians.

Why must so many people die unnecessarily? Why must so many people in the 21st Century live in fear?

Next month we shall be remembering again. We shall be remembering the coming of the Prince of Peace into the world. God so loved the world that He gave us His Son to show us how we should live. But, the trouble is, the world has turned its back on the One who gave us the Prince of Peace.

All of you who are reading these Reflections are Christians. We all follow Jesus. But so often we fall short of His teachings. Do we use the words Jesus would use? Do we show kindness to those with whom we come into contact?

It is good that we remember those who gave their lives, or who have lived with physical injuries or mental scars for many years because of war, and I have no doubt that we shall be observing Remembrance Sunday for many years to come -- and so we should. But can we do our bit to bring peace in the places where we live and work.

We owe a deep sense of gratitude to those who gave their lives in the two World Wars and in so many conflicts in recent years, and we shall stand and remember them this Remembrance Sunday, but let us, who live 100 years since the first Remembrance Sunday, all follow the Prince of Peace and live in His ways, so that peace may reign wherever we go.

Let's be there in good numbers and remember, we are an L.E.P - Methodist and URC Church! Tessa G.




GUY FAWKES NIGHT.
