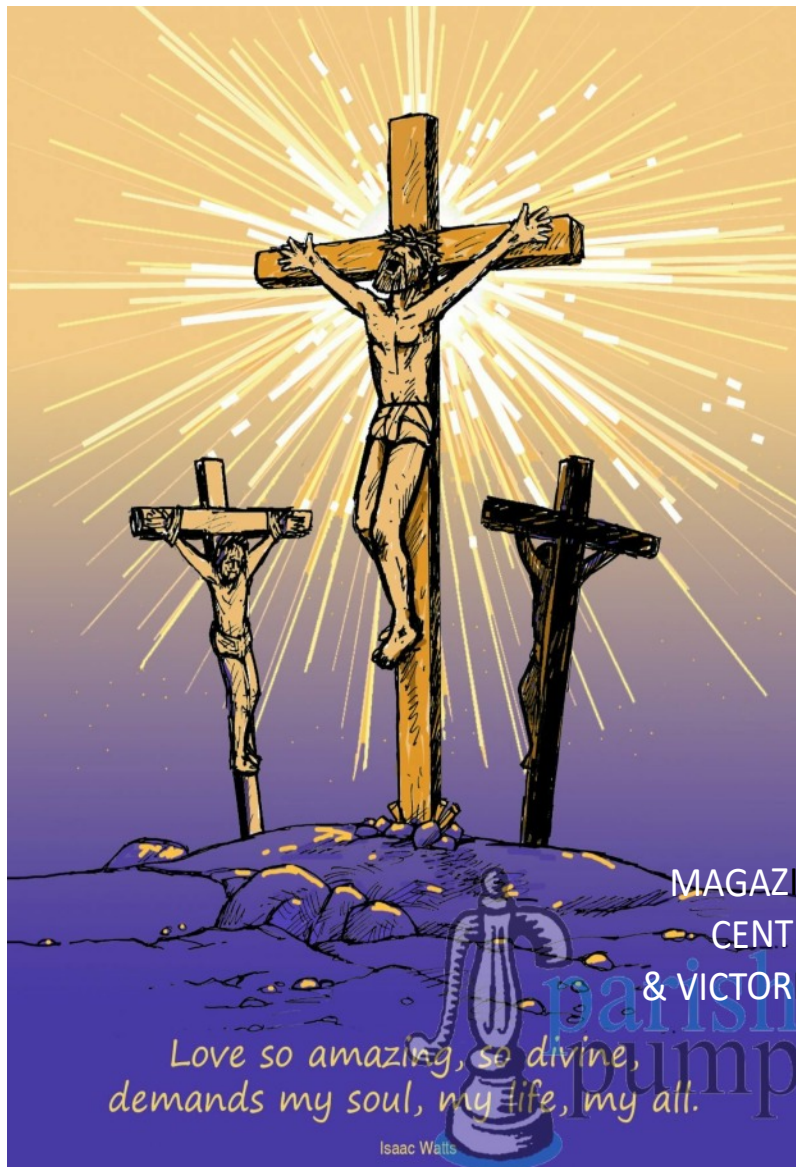

A LETTER FROM OUR LEADER

I am very sorry that I am writing this letter, and for the reasons that I am doing it. I am sure I speak for all of you when I say that we wish Jon well and pray God's Blessing on him in the future.

In four weeks' time on 21st April, I have no doubt that Irene will be using the same words at the beginning of the Service at Victoria Park as I shall be using at Central.

The 21st April is Easter Day and Irene and I will be saying "The Lord is Risen" -- and the congregation will reply "He is Risen Indeed".

After all the preparation of Lent and the sadness of Holy Week, both of our Churches will be decorated with beautiful flowers, and the Cross which has been filled with all the symbols of Lent, will be transformed to a Cross of Triumph. And we shall be singing wonderful hymns which will reflect the Triumph of God's raising Jesus from death to life.

On Good Friday Jesus suffered terribly. He was crucified. That death was the worst possible death anyone could endure. It was a time of humiliation and great pain. Why did He go through all that? Because of you and me. Jesus was sinless, and yet He hung on that Cross because WE were FULL of sin. Jesus bore our sin so that we could be forgiven and have a relationship with God. Fancy going through all that for us. But Jesus did.

Then when God raised Jesus from the tomb, Jesus opened up the way to Heaven for us.

You know the words "He died that we might be forgiven, He died to make us good, that we might go at last to Heaven, SAVED by HIS precious blood". And then we sing "There was no other good enough to pay the price of sin, He ONLY could unlock the gate of Heaven, and let us in".

This is why we call Jesus, our Saviour. And He died for us all. There may be someone reading this who doesn't go regularly to a place of worship. Just let me repeat that last sentence -- He died for us ALL. -- that means everyone who is reading this letter. And when we breathe our last breath, Jesus will be there waiting for us and welcoming us into Heaven where we shall worship around the throne, and meet all our loved ones who have gone there before us.

Easter is wonderful.

May God bless you all this Easter. Consider what Jesus did on Good Friday and rejoice on Easter Day that God raised Him and Jesus is alive. Let me close with words from another hymn – “He lives, He lives, Christ Jesus lives today. He walks with me and talks with me along life’s narrow way” May you feel Him talking and walking with you.

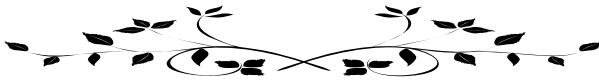
Tony enjoyed football and watched Torquay United and would often take Jane and Mark to matches. He also supported Arsenal!

Every year the young people in the Kombo Western Circuit in The Gambia work hard producing 20,000 Crosses. This is their way of supporting their Circuit, helping to raise the finances to pay their Minister and to support the youth work in the Circuit. This is vital in an area where most people are subsistence farmers who can only make a nominal donation to church collections.

These dedicated young folk set us an extreme example of commitment to ensuring that the worth of God can be effective and that the Gospel can continue to be proclaimed in their area. As you hold your Cross in your hand, please pray for the person (unknown to you personally) who has made it, as their churches will be praying for those (equally unknown to them personally) who receive them. After all, we all belong to the family of God.

Your Crosses are not of uniform size. Like the children and young people who make them, and the congregations who receive them, there are small ones and big ones, light ones and dark ones, but each Cross serves an important purpose, reminding us of Jesus entering Jerusalem and of His wish to enter our hearts and minds and lives.

EASTER MORNING: THE OTHER' MARY

As the traditional Easter story is rehearsed again this month, you may notice that there is one name that frequently occurs. It is that of the 'other' Mary – not the mother of Jesus, but Mary of Magdalene, who stood by her at the cross and became the first human being actually to meet the risen Christ.

That's quite a record for a woman who, the Gospels tell us, had been delivered by Jesus from 'seven devils' – New Testament language for some dark and horrible affliction of body, mind or spirit. As a result, her devotion to Him was total and her grief at His death overwhelming.

In church history Mary Magdalene became the 'fallen woman' a harlot who was rescued and forgiven by Jesus but there is no evidence to prove she was a 'fallen woman' but the contrast is sublime, Mary the virgin mother, the symbol of purity. Mary Magdalene, the scarlet woman who was saved and forgiven, the symbol of redemption. Surely, we all fall somewhere between those two extremes.

The dark cloud from which she was delivered may have been sexual, we are not told. What we do know is that the two Marys stood together at the cross, the Blessed Virgin and the woman rescued from who knows what darkness and despair.

The second great moment for her was as unexpected as it was momentous. She had gone with other women to the tomb of Jesus and found it empty. An angelic figure told them that Jesus was not there, He had risen – and the others drifted off. But Mary stayed, reluctant to leave it like that. She became aware of a man nearby, whom she took to be the gardener. She explained to Him that the body of 'her Lord' had been taken away and she didn't know where to find Him.

The man simply said her name 'Mary' and she instantly realised it was Jesus. She made to hug Him, but He told her not to touch Him because his resurrection was not yet complete. She was, however, to go to the male disciples and tell them she had met Him. She did – but they couldn't believe her.

Her words – 'I have seen the Lord' – echo down the centuries, the very beating heart of the Christian gospel.

BEAUTY IN AFGHANISTON

YOU ARE WHAT YOU THINK ABOUT!

Negative thoughts can actually harm you, physically. In a recent study by the universities of Exeter and Oxford, it was found that if you listen to that critical inner voice, you will end up with an increased heart rate, consistent with feelings of being under threat and distress.

On the other hand, positive thoughts have the opposite effect. Those in the study who were encouraged to be kind to themselves when things went wrong, reported more self-compassion, connection with others, and had feelings of relaxation and safety.

No wonder that Paul urges us: "Brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things... And the God of peace will be with you." (Philippians 4: 8,9)

APRIL 1ST – FOOLING AROUND *by Canon David Winter*

I was about six when I began to enjoy April Fool's Day. My older brother was very clever at appropriate hoaxes, not only deceiving me but also mum and dad. On the whole my childish efforts were encouraged. The day was full of laughs, even at school, where the teachers would try to trick us and all day long no one quite believed anything they were told. So it went on, year after year, though I think it all seems as a bit unsophisticated for the modern generation.

You couldn't say that, though, about probably the most famous April Fool's effort of all time. In the 1960's BBC TV broadcast a feature on the spaghetti farms of Italy. Even those of us who bought our spaghetti in the supermarket from the pasta shelves began to wonder if we'd been wrong. Italian farmers explained their work and the progress of the spaghetti plants was carefully filmed, from planting to reaping. And all in the BBC's most serious documentary manner. It took a while to appreciate that this was Aunty playing games. Whatever next!

The odd thing is that no one is quite sure of the origin of this very British tradition. Most attribute it to changes in Britain's calendar in the 1700s, when New Year's Day moved from March 25th to January 1st. Not surprisingly, the change caused a lot of confusion and mistakes around the start of April. Others look further back, to the ancient Roman feast of Hilaria, when the goddess Cybele was celebrated with pranks and jokes around the spring equinox, March 25th. Either way a touch of hilarity at the end of Lent does not seem amiss. Go to Greece, where the resurrection of Jesus is celebrated with fireworks and parties to see how it might work.

OPEN DOORS

“My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?”

Jesus despairing cry is echoed today by Christian women around the world who are suffering not only for their faith, but also for their gender. Open Doors’ ground-breaking research has revealed that women are doubly vulnerable to persecution – persecution that is robbing them of their security, identity and self-worth.

Esther from Nigeria was kidnapped by Boko Haram as a teenager. “Each passing day, I hated myself more and more. I felt that God had forsaken me....but I could still not get myself to renounce Him. I found myself remembering His promise to never leave me or forsake me.”

Thanks to your support, Esther has been able to attend trauma care programmes run by Open Doors partners. But there are many others like her who go unseen and unheard. Will you choose to **see** women like Esther, and empower them to fulfil their God-Given potential?

Esther says “God bless you! If I had not attended this programme, I think I would have developed serious health problems...I lack the words to say thank you. All I can say is: May God bless you and thank you so much.

EASTER TRIVIA QUIZ

What was the largest ever Easter egg hunt?

The most-ever entrants for an egg hunt competition was 12,773. It was The Fabergé Big Egg Hunt, as part of World Record London, in London, UK in April 2012.

What was the largest-ever decorated Easter egg?

This was built in March 2008, by Freeport in Alcochete, Portugal. It measured 14.79 m (48 ft 6 in) long and 8.40 m (27 ft 6 in) in diameter.

What was the largest ever chocolate Easter egg?

It was made in Tosca (Italy) and weighed 7,200 kg (15,873 lbs 4.48 oz). It had a circumference of 19.6 m (64 ft 3.65 in) at its widest point. It was exhibited in a shopping centre in Cortenuova, Italy, in April 2011.

What was the largest ever Easter egg tree?

This was set by Zoo Rostock GmbH, Rostock, Germany, who decorated a tree with 76,596 painted hens' eggs in April 2007.

What about the most expensive hot cross bun?

This was baked in 1829 in Stepney, London, UK. It was bought by Bill Foster (UK) for £155 at the Antiques for Everyone show at the NEC in Birmingham, West Midlands, UK, in April 2000. Hot cross buns were originally made to hang in the kitchen to ward off evil spirits.

What was the biggest-ever (real) Easter bunny?

So far, the longest rabbit was Darius, a Flemish giant rabbit owned by Annette Edwards (UK), who was found to be 4 ft 3 in (129 cm) long when measured for an article in the UK's Daily Mail newspaper in April 2010.

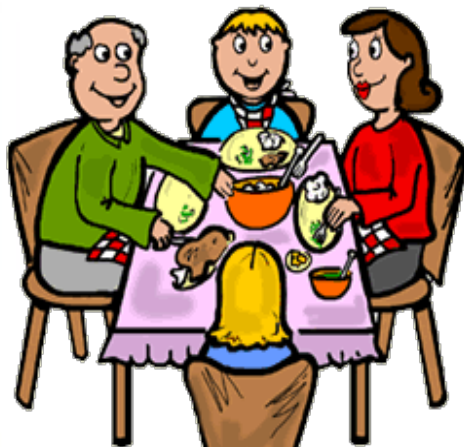
