MINISTER

Peter Williamson writes. . . .

Whilst this edition of 'Cornerstone' covers both December and January this will be the only opportunity I'll get to write to you about Christmas; so this will be a sort of pre-Christmas message as well as one that will go into the New Year too. Along the way I'll touch on Christmas too. In fact (surprise, surprise) I'm majoring on the festival of Christmas. With everybody else already preparing for the festive season, why not me too? And as you read you'll find that what I'm on about doesn't apply just to Christmas. In fact I'm turning you away from something that's 'just Christmassy' to something that could be very everyday.

Christmas is a Christian holiday – a celebration of the One who lived a special life and, by example, gave us instruction on how to live life in all its fulness. The secular world has muscled in on it and is starting to call it 'Midwinter Festival' or 'Winter Holiday' or some such variation but essentially for us Christmas is a celebration of the birth of Christ.

We proclaim, "Joy to the world; peace on earth; and, goodwill to men," during the Christmas season, but joy, peace and goodwill do not just suddenly appear because it is Christmas; although we may see more people striving towards those values at this time of year; (or perhaps, not, as the pressures of the big day loom ever larger!!!) Such sought after principles only emerge once a master principle has been accepted — a disregard of self and a willing acceptance of self-sacrifice.

I remember the self-sacrifice of my hardworking parents as they struggled to provide the material things they thought would make their little boy happy on Christmas morning. What has outlasted those gifts was the emotional support – the love and guidance- that my parents shared during the times we spent together, at home, in church and with school activities.

Today, as then, it is often easier for us to give material things to each other rather than provide an incentive for some of the traditions and

experiences that we observe at Christmas, to become principles for living throughout the year: such as:

- Togetherness: The family seated around the table for the holiday meal, which also can be the family seated around the table for a daily meal together.
- Family Prayer: The time devoted to thanking God on Christmas Day for the good things of life; which can be extended to time set aside for communicating with God every day.
- Anticipation: Facing each day with the spirit of a child on Christmas morning, generating an enthusiasm and joy that can be contagious to everyone we encounter at home, church, work or school.
- Self-sacrifice: How we "go out of our way" for Christmas, which can also be how we make that little bit extra effort on a daily basis; giving gifts of time, concern and assistance – giving love each and every day.

An impossibility you say? Surely trying to attempt all of that for one *day* is well nigh impossible without being asked to do it *daily!* I totally agree with you. It is not humanly possible – but with *God ALL* things are possible.

The impossible becomes possible when we take on board the fact that God loved us so much that He sent His Son, so that we might live an eternal life filled with joy, peace and goodwill. Then we can embody the Christmas spirit throughout the year, celebrating not just with a special day or a special week, but with a special life bringing with it joy, peace and goodwill; which is where I began — so in order not to repeat myself, I'll shut up. but not quite.

May the old story of Christmas be Good News to you and yours again this year as we remember God's gift to his children. Let's open our minds and hearts to hear the Christmas story anew and remember that "Love Came Down at Christmas."

RESTORING PEACE IN IRAQ

Another story of good news in Iraq! Christians in northern Iraq have new hope for a more peaceful future, thanks to your support for the Hope for the Middle East campaign.

With your help Open Doors partners have now restored over 1,270 houses in the Christian villages of the Ninevah Plain. Louy (42) a father, teacher and follower of Christ, is one of many Christians who have returned to their village determined to restore peace in their communities.

In 2014 Louy and his family had to flee their home in Bartella when so-called Islamic State (IS) invaded the region. After several years away, the family returned, repairing their home with help from Open Doors' local partners. Louy is so grateful to everyone who has supported them.

Perhaps you can remember a stressful time when you had to move to a new place.

Louy describes how his 12 year old son Sharbel 'felt cut off from his friends, his school, his street and home.'

Now they are back, Sharbel says: "It's much better now; my friends are here and the church is nearby.

Despite all the family have endured they continue to trust God. Louy says "Even during our displacement, we said that it may be God's plan for us as Christians. This is our life – we've built it on this basis and we thank God in every situation."

As a teacher at a school with many Muslim students, Louy teaches peace in his classroom. "We as Christian's are considered 'sons of peace'."

PRAY that Iraqi Christians would be encouraged, protected and enabled to share the gospel, despite the enormous challenges of living in a Muslim majority country.

ALL SAINTS DAY



Many New Year parties work on this theme of change too; and a game that never fails to intrigue and amuse is the Identification Parade. (Each partygoer brings along a photograph of themselves taken before they were twelve months old!) It's quite a job deciding which playful plump infant is now your Church Steward, Treasurer or Organist. And whether the red and wrinkled new born baby is now that gorgeous bombshell who is the centre of the party OR which of your ministers — if either!

Looking at old photographs is a useful reminder that time never stands still. Everything is changing either fast or slowly.

The way God created the universe shows us that He did not intend us to be bored by monotony. He is the creator of infinite change. Day and night, sunshine, shower calm and storm; spring summer, autumn, winter—as well as everything else, reminds us that everything is on the move.

We are changing too – and not only on the outside. We are different in other ways too. We hear people say, "He's a different man to what he was six months ago."
