

Peter Williamson writes. . . .

Somebody has become, or maybe has become again, world famous. Days and days of waiting, either there at Wimbledon or watching the television/computer screen; head left, head right; groans of despair, roars of applause, the odd tantrum or two maybe, chalk flying, judges and umpires scowled at or groaned at; and those annoying words – fifteen, thirty, forty, deuce, game – oh! And I nearly forgot, *love*.

Have you ever stopped and thought about the method of scoring at tennis? I find it most odd.

The first single point you gain and it's fifteen right away. You gain another point and it's thirty. Then you score again and it makes - forty (why isn't it fortyfive?). 
In the world today, there is an increasing tendency to denigrate love, to count it as a failure, something weak, something of little worth. The game of life goes to the strong and powerful, those who pile up the scores no matter how they do it; and love is to be shunned.

The Bible says there are three things which last for ever. Faith, hope and love. Folk today tend to laugh at such sentiments – consider them to belong to a past age. The things that last for ever, they say, are wealth, fame position, power and possessions – not love. Such folk have no time for a service of love – they are quite prepared to take advantage; they don't want to be hampered by umpires and judges. Rather they want to win at any price and for them love means losing, as it does in tennis. You win with a fifteen per cent rise in salary, with thirty minutes a day off working hours, with a forty per cent increase in dividends – however that has all been achieved. Let those who will talk on foolishly about love.

I believe in love and I'm making my plea for greater love to be shown in relationships, in church, in society – that sacrificial love as lived and taught by Jesus and because of which he died. I'm doing it with the inner confidence that when love meant for Him a cross and it looked as though He had lost, in fact He had won – game, set and match for all time. And all who try to follow Him and His ways are now on the winning side – whether you are playing tennis, any other sport, or, and most importantly – the game of life.

Prayer for the day: Loving Lord, help us day by day to live in your love and to demonstrate it in victorious living. Amen.



A REFLECTION

What are your feet like? Well, I am having terrible trouble with mine!! The younger among you reading this Magazine probably don't have any trouble at all. But for those of us 'of a certain age' suffer!

How many of you visit a Chiropodist, or have one come to your home? They will see your nails are alright; they will deal with corns and callouses; and generally spruce up your feet.

Well, my trouble is, my feet are costing me a fortune!! Let me explain. I have bunions (as many of you will I expect), and those bunions are forcing my big toes over to my other toes, and making them double up as it were. So, when I say that my feet are costing me a fortune, it is because the shoes which fitted me 6 months ago, no longer do. They are all rubbing the joints of those toes which are being forced up to the top of my shoes -- even my sandals. Do any of you have that trouble? I could sell you shoes which I have hardly worn!! I know, some people have far more trouble with their feet than I do with mine, if they have diabetes.

Feet are so important, aren't they? They enable us to walk, run (if we are young), and make sure that we can do all we need to do each day. Feet are mentioned many, many times in the Bible. Jesus' feet were nailed to the Cross. And one text which comes to mind is to be found in Isaiah Chapter 52 and verse 7. That verse says "How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim salvation, who say to Zion, 'Your God reigns'.

Isaiah was talking about the Jews who were going to come back from Babylon after the exile. God says that when the people return to Zion (Jerusalem), they will be able to tell others of the good news of salvation, and bring peace. They will be able to proclaim that their God reigns.

It is a privilege to be able to share God's Good News with others. It is a privilege to be able to share with others the love of Jesus, and of His redemption, salvation and peace. And God says that the feet of those who bring good news to others are 'beautiful'.

In that lovely hymn by Frances Ridley Havergal, two of the lines say:-"Take my feet, and let them be Swift and beautiful for Thee".

God loves beautiful feet. He looks beyond the corns, the callouses and the bunions, and looks to see if they are being used to help others.

Feet will be on show during these two months -- when, in the heat, they will be bare. Many feet will be getting sand between their toes.

But, when you next look at your feet, and I look at mine, let us, like God, look beyond their shape, and ask ourselves whether they are going to the people and places where someone is in need -- whether they are going where Jesus wants them to go.

I wish you all a Happy Summer. Enjoy the long hours of daylight. And each day let's all thank God for all that we see around us, and proclaim that 'Our God reigns'.

PACK TO THE FUTURE

King David had his rod and staff and Elijah had his mantle. Dorcas from Nigeria has her mama packs.

A mama pack is a simple carrier bag of sanitary items: soap, bleach and sanitary pads. She gives the bag to expectant mothers. To Dorcas, the bags are a sign of her calling from God. A sign that he is with her as she does her vital work.

'I feel good,' she says. 'I feel that, "Yes. God is really working with me."' Dorcas is a single mother who lives with HIV, like millions in Nigeria. Trained and supported by Tearfund's local church partner, she works as a Mother Buddy in her village. Her job is to make sure each mother has a safe delivery and a healthy baby.

Most importantly, she makes sure that mothers with HIV don't pass the virus on to their newborn children. Since she started educating the women in her community, there have been no mother-to-child HIV transmissions. None at all!

The mothers-to-be clearly love their mother buddy – they call her 'auntie' and 'sister'. She dispenses kind words and good advice to all of them. 'We encourage them to feel a sense of belonging,' says Dorcas.

And along with the mama bags she gives them dignity. You see, without those items, the women wouldn't be admitted to the local hospitals to give birth. What a difference a small bag of sanitary goods makes.

It's a perfect example of how something simple can make a profound difference.

Of course, this applies to our prayers as well. Sometimes it might seem as though they don't amount to much, but in God's hands they are powerful. Even the most humble of prayers can have a greater impact than we could imagine.

Loving God, Thank you for Dorcas, and for the amazing impact she's had in her community. Thank you that when we offer you what we have, extraordinary things can happen. OPEN DOORS

Naomi* is a pastor's wife from **Indonesia**, a country with rising religious intolerance. Besides some violent attacks on churches, Christians experience discrimination and verbal abuse. Most of the members of Naomi's church are from a Muslim background, and face oppression from their families.

"Families who are forced to leave home for accepting Jesus have to live in other church members' houses," she says. "Their relatives only want them back when their economic situation improves. Their children are frequently mocked at school. But we stand strong."

As many Indonesian Christians struggle with poverty, Open Doors runs projects to help improve their economic situation. With this support, Naomi is not only investing in new skills for herself, but also passing on what she learns to other women in her church.

"Last year I attended a handicraft workshop held by Open Doors. Then I passed on my new skills to my church members....after the workshop the ladies were able to increase their income by 20 dollars a month."

Naomi has also been learning tailoring at the Women's Training centre built by Open Doors. "Every Sunday I show my work to my church members. I also want to train the youth in my church with new skills. That way they can be economically independent, create jobs and be a blessing in our village. I have many dreams now because of Open Doors. "Thank you."
