THE MINISTER

Happy New Year!

You may be surprised at such a greeting and perhaps think that the author of such a greeting has "lost the plot" or has forgotten the date for which this text has been developed. It is, however, simply explained by the fact that as a Methodist Minister I recognise that September marks the beginnings of the Church Year, a time when Methodist Ministers begin new appointments, or finally "sit down", which means "retire" in common usage: although I would argue that no one in ministry ever retires! The phrase "Sit down" refers to the fact that the Methodist Minister is no longer available to be moved around the country, stationed is the proper word, at the behest of the Methodist Conference. For the Methodist Church September marks the beginning of the ecclesiastical new year. I suspect that different Christian denominations all have their ecclesiastical years too.

But September also marks a new year for Central in that officially, from September 1st the United Reformed Church becomes responsible for supplying a Minister to look after Central, since the Central Constitution requires a normal pattern of alternating ministry between the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church. At the time of writing, discussions are underway to identify such a minister and to discuss with them how the ministry at Central will be organised. Both Peter Williamson and I are happy to continue in our current roles for the time being although I am sure readers will understand that we need to know what sort of role we can play in a supporting a new minister and we will be working with the Leadership Team to seek an acceptable solution.

Of course, a new year, is also a time for resolutions. What will yours be? Typically resolutions are focussed on ourselves, in the sense that we will, according to a recent survey, resolve to lose weight, take more exercise, give up smoking.

I wonder how relevant these are to our situation as a church. After all, we are in a time of uncertainty, and the way ahead does not seem clear! What we need to work on, through prayer and reflection, is a vision for what we seek to be as a church. There will, I am sure, be disagreements as to our future direction. Let me call such disagreements, "Friction". For, my training as a physicist reminds me that nothing works without a little bit of friction. I would invite you to consider the motor vehicle whose tyres have no friction on the road surface. You will easily recognise that such a vehicle will make no forward progress without friction.

Our challenge, or perhaps in the context of New Year resolutions, our resolution is to work with the friction that different ideas and views will generate so that we can move forward as a church. Above all we need to seek God's direction through prayer, and to listen carefully and constructively to each other and to what God is saying to us. For it is in this that we will truly move forward into the future which God has for us all.

FINANCE REPORT FROM TREASURER STEVE NORMAN

I am writing to give you an up to date report on the state of our finances for the first 7 months of this year, January through July 2019, and also our income and expenditure for the month July 2019. Firstly, my thanks as usual to Paul Sherriff for keeping the finance accounts so well.

Given annual costs of around £120,000 we should be making £10,000 of income per month (around £2,300 per week) just to break even. Ideally, we should be earning in excess of £15,000 per month in order to re-build our reserves to pay for things like leaks in the (17) flat roofs and to undertake other internal modernisations.

In fact July's offerings were £3,298 or £825 per week which includes envelopes, standing orders and loose offerings. So, you can see just how reliant we are on other forms of income, including room hire, catering, donations and Christmas Fayres to keep the Church going.

In terms of year to date, January through July 2019, our profit and loss statement is showing a loss of £5,735 against a planned loss of £11,290. However, this planned loss assumed that we had received a Gift Aid payment of £9,000 which has not yet come in yet. If it had, we would be making a small profit of around £3,300!

Our change to a United Reform Church this year will also potentially help to reduce costs of ministry. If we were to have a part time URC minister and also continue to rely on local and supernumerary ministers to support both our ongoing pastoral and preaching requirements then this will undoubtedly prolong the life of the Church.

In summary, if we can avoid any other major expenditures this year and we all pull together to increase our offerings and donations and support other income related activities then there is a chance we can make a smaller than planned loss.....we may even break-even, which would be a minor miracle compared with the nearly £30,000 loss we made last year!

God moves in mysterious ways..... Financial felicitations to you all.

REBUILDING YOUR LIFE WHEN DISASTER HITS

Circumstances can change in the blink of an eye. What was so certain can be swept away and our world can be suddenly uprooted.

This is Yaema's* survival story. Yaema lost almost everything when floods hit Sierra Leone's capital in 2017. Her husband, swept away. Their home, ruined. Her business, destroyed. Only her children remained safe. 'I could not salvage anything', she shares.

Before the disaster, Yaema was a business owner. Her children went to school, and she was able to provide for them. In her own words, 'We were a happy family'.

Overnight everything changed. When the floods hit, the family sought refuge at a church – a Tearfund local partner – where they received food, water and toiletries. 'We survived on what the church gave us', Yaema says.

Rebuilding

At Tearfund we are passionate about working with people to secure their own future. Our local partners supported Yaema in the interim, but it was important to help her with the tools she needed to rebuild her life. To help Yaema in the long term, our local partner gave her a cash grant. With the money she has rented a house and opened a small shop, which she plans to grow. What's important to Yaema is that she is able to provide for her family again.

Trust in God

Yaema is certain it was God that helped turn her life around. 'God saw my tears and he helped me out. I give him glory and praise because he did it for me and my family'.

The greenfly on the roses, the maggots in the peas, Manure that fills our noses, He also gave us these. *All things spray and swattable..etc.*.


The fungus on the goosegogs, the Club root in the greens, The slugs that eat the lettuce and chew the aubergines. All things spray and swattable...etc...
